Background:

Child abuse is when a child (aged 0-18 including an unborn child) is harmed by an adult or another child/young person. Somebody may abuse or neglect a child by inflicting harm or by failing to act to prevent harm. The Children Act 1989 outlines Significant Harm as the threshold which justifies compulsory intervention in family life in the best interests of children. Section 47 of the Act places a duty on local authorities to make enquiries, or cause enquiries to be made, where it has reasonable cause to suspect that a child is suffering, or is likely to suffer significant harm.

'Harm' means ill-treatment or the impairment of health or development, including that suffered from seeing or hearing the ill-treatment of another.





What to do if you are worried about Child abuse or neglect



Why it matters:

All children have a right to protection and live their life free from abuse or harm. All adults in contact with children and young people have a duty to protect children and young people from harm (sometimes termed 'safeguarding')
